

I'm sure everyone has been touching up on the Rules of Racing as we have been gearing up. (or not...) In reading Racing Rules of Sailing, you might not have made it all the way to Section 50. In this section, there's a rule that is largely dismissed by many out on the course, and it's quite a safety hazard.

50.2 Spinnaker Poles; Whisker Poles

Only one spinnaker pole or whisker pole shall be used at a time except when gybing. When in use, it shall be attached to the foremost mast.

It's easy not to stop to think about what a large gust of wind could do until it happens. Putting a person at the front of the boat, holding a pole that is connected to a sail is a recipe for disaster—lost teeth, an overboard, or worse! It may cost a few dollars to fix the other end of your poles to make them attach to your mast, but it's less than medical bills.

Bottom line is I'm not bringing this rule up to be hard on anyone or to stir up protests, but rather to help everyone realize that there is a rule out there for our benefit—and safety— that many of us have been disregarding. I trust we would rather all avoid the protest room, and stay friends winning races outright, but let's protect our crew as well. So, let's have fun *and* be safe!

GSC wants to know....

In case you were wondering who Bill Mentzer was when we presented awards in January, longtime GSC member Jennie Hayslip (since 1974) gathered information about Bill and why we honor him.

Bill and Caroline Mentzer were two of the early seventies members and he was 2^{nd} Rear Commodore in 1976 and 1977. Their boat was a Buccaneer 24 named *Magic*. He served as Club Engineer during the nineties until his death in 1995. As Club Engineer, Bill pretty much became the heart and soul of the Club, running the club office, monitoring the phone and weather station and greeting newcomers. Since he lived in Grapevine close to the lake he was there on almost a daily basis. He made sure the rescue boat *Calypso* was properly berthed and maintained and ready for the Club's next event. He also made sure members were properly trained and qualified to run *Calypso*.

How did Gold Rush get its name?

Jennie contacted several members from the early days and Perry Clark remembers this:

Coors Brewing Company, based in Golden, CO was a sponsor for the regatta. The slogan used was, "It was a race for the gold". The first "Gold Rush Regatta" poster carries the date September 5, 6, and 7, 1977.

Charlotte Ragan won the perpetual trophy with her rum bread pudding! This was another dish that helped us stay warm.





I first met George Talbot when he showed up at the dock to give me my check ride on *Sophia*. I took one look at him and immediately knew that this was some salty dog sailor that had spent his life on the sea. Wrong! Sailing was a recent addition to George's life but as I came to realize George had one mode of operation in his life, excel at everything. In the words of former

SailAway Director, Glen Sirles, "George and I shared many good times. He always had a story, was always taking a new class of some sort, many of them sailing. He always had a story." Glen goes on to say "George was willing to help us do anything that needed doing. I asked him to help me clean the engineer's closet and clean it he did. He would say to me, "just tell me what you want done". He tossed items, he moved items, he vacuumed, he rearranged. We stirred up a lot of dust; but, it was better in the end. And, George kept us both entertained the entire time with stories and laughter." Another SailAway director, Joe McMahon had similar observations "George kept you on your toes with a very quirky sense of humor." One of my favorite memories follows:



We'll call this story "Calm, Cool & Collected"

This happened earlier this year, probably the March work party. The air temperature was still quite chilly. We were planning to do something on *Sophia*; I can't even recall what. I do know we needed the outboard. I hopped on board and started removing the engine cover. There's a knot in the chinch cord that's difficult to untie so I have to lean way over the engine. As I start to gather up the cover I'm thinking that it feels somewhat heavy. Maybe there's a bit of water trapped inside? I gather it toward me in a ball, trying not to get wet. As I pull it close to my chest it's also close to my face. I look inside; it's not water, it's a snake! It may have crawled in the last time the engine was warm to escape the chill. Well in honesty, the snake was probably 4 feet long and an inch in a half in diameter but to this former northern boy that's never seen a snake bigger than a foot, it looks like a six foot water moccasin. I call out, in what I hope was a deep manly voice, "It's a snake". It probably really sounded like a panicked nine year old girl. George calmly walks out to the dock. "Here, give it to me". I hand off the bundle like it's a lit time bomb in a cartoon. George looks in, the bundle inches from his face now. "Yeah, it's a Blotched Water snake" he says as he calmly reaches in, grabs it out of the engine cover and throws it back into the lake.

George is not a tall man but that moment, that day, the scared little boy in me thought that he was 10 feet tall. One of my favorite work party memories.

Glen Sirles recruited George to take over *Sofia* as Captain. Glenn recalls, "He cleaned her, painted her, sealed her and made her as best she could be. Just give him guidance and a green light, then stand out of his way. He got things done."

I was fortunate to work with George at what turned out to be his last work party day. He already knew that he was ill but he didn't share it with any of us. As usual with boats on Lake Grapevine that sit in the hot Texas sun all summer, the spreader boots needed replacing. We needed someone to ride the Bosun's chair. Here's a man of 61, but George just about insists that he's the man to go up. It's a cold blustery day in March and his up there for the better of an hour. While George seemed a bit winded with the task, he

was determined to persevere. He didn't come down until the task was done and done well. Just another day working with George I thought. That was the last time we saw him at SailAway.

Those of us that knew George consider ourselves lucky. We all have fond memories of the man. What I have found out since then was how small a part of his wonderful life I was aware of. There is a wonderful Facebook page dedicated to George, administered by his daughter (Every Dad with Dad). 

Jeff worked with the Optis on course awareness, as well as boat speed and tacking. The Lasers worked on start speed, and practiced slightly more advanced techniques such as roll tacking and kiting. Max also talked to them about the importance of sail shape and adjusting sails to the conditions.

There was discussion of one more practice before the team heads to New Braunfels for the weekend of Spring Break. Weather permitting, we will gather to practice and load boats onto trailers for travel. This regatta is a favorite among the juniors and their families.

The adults met while the youth sailed, and discussed details and plans for the Silly String Regatta. It was brought to attention that we will need additional volunteers for the start lines of Green Fleet, RWB, and Laser/420. The volunteers in the past have been amazing, and we hope to get as many as possible for this year. All help will be greatly appreciated, and we look forward to hosting this regatta.

Practice Makes Perfect.

With the spring series and our first annual regatta coming up, we have a great racing education program for everyone. As you may recall from previous discussions, there is a sailing pyramid as outlined below:





For our practices, most of our time will be focused on boat speed. We will work on drills that will help you sail faster both upwind and downwind. I like to think of sailing similar to golf, it is not about who is faster, but who minimizes mistakes and cuts strokes (or time in sailing). So we will work on mark roundings, setting up for upwind and downwind work, tacking, and starting. All of these items will help you cut minutes from your race time. And if you look at the scores, the difference between the top of the fleet and the middle of the fleet is usually less that a minute during a one hour race. For this program, we are going to try to get all of the boats to come out and join us including the fleet leaders. Rather than use onboard coaches, we will have the best boats out so you have someone to pace against. So get your crew together and join us on Thursday nights at 6:30. If you are want to learn, but are not racing with someone, come out and see if anyone needs crew. We will not be assigning boats, but I am sure someone will be looking to pick up crew for the series and regattas.

In addition we will start the program with two classroom sessions, one focused on tactics and racing rules and the other focused on strategy and sportsmanship. The first classroom session will start on March 8th at 6:30 in the classroom. See you then.
